


speed increased to eighty words per minute. My typing and computer skills are something I've been grateful for as a creative writer.

I received payments for articles in magazines such as *NZ Wilderness* and a short story in *Woman's Day*. I did earn enough to cover the invested course fee. I also became a member of The New Zealand Christian Writers Guild which is what NZ Christian Writers used to be called. Later, *The Writing School* changed their name to *The Sackville Academy*, and I completed another course with them, *The Certificate of Professional Proofreading and Copy Editing*.

Over the years I have enjoyed using my writing skills for the Lord in a variety of ways. I've written children's church lessons, church stage productions, school plays, skits, songs and puppet shows for outreach into the community. I achieved a finals list for a Northland short story competition and my children's novel was shortlisted for the Tom Fitzgibbon Award. The children's novel, entitled *Dog Tucker*, went on to be accepted for publishing by Scholastic NZ. It was sold in New Zealand and Australia and received a Storylines award for Junior Fiction. *Dog Tucker* is currently out of print but can be requested from most public libraries if you'd like to read it.

For several years, I've had the desire to learn how to produce a magazine. However, I didn't want to invest my time in something which wasn't contributing to growing God's Kingdom. When I saw the advert for this editor role my initial reaction was a lack of confidence, but the Lord encouraged me to apply. I've found the NZ Christian Writers team to be a lovely, encouraging group of people and glory to God, here I am. I'm looking forward to future opportunities to connect with our members, readers and contributors. I believe it's going to be a journey of mutual encouragement as we support each other in our Christian writing. # How Writers Can Use Facebook and Avoid Scams

Here are some tips for how to use Facebook effectively and what things to watch out for.

#### **Getting Started With Your Personal Page**

Starting with the basics, if you've not used Facebook before you will need to go to the Facebook homepage and sign up, creating your personal page. This page does not have to be for your general readers and my recommendation is you keep it private and only add friends you know personally. As you set up your personal page the helpful tutorial will take you through the steps.

#### **Protect Your Private Information**

With any personal information you provide, such as date of birth, email addresses, postal address locations and phone numbers, it's best to click on the privacy settings and keep them so that only you can see them, no one else. Take time to click on the drop-down menus and learn what all your options are. You can search for people you know in the search bar and it's helpful to look on your friends' lists of friends to find people.

#### **Sharing Your News**

Once you're set up you can type/post on your personal page any updates of your writing news or upload photos and videos. When you post on your page you can choose who will see it. You may choose the public (anyone who views your page but is not on your list of friends) or just your friends or specific friends.

Facebook's software picks up certain words in your page content and targets you with related advertising. Christians may find they see advertising of a spiritual nature which is not Christian. You are able to click the X (usually located in the top right-hand corner) to close adverts or posts if they are something you don't want to see. You can supply feedback as to why you don't want to see it by selecting the suitable answers.

#### **Connecting With Others**

If you wish to speak directly to one of your friends privately, then you can send them a 'pm' or private chat message. For private messages Facebook uses Messenger which is also available as a separate app for internet-friendly mobile phones. It's important to be aware that strangers can try and connect with you via the Messenger app without being on your Facebook friends list. To connect with other Christian writers you can search in the search bar for Christian writers group pages to join. There are many kinds of special-interest group pages available.

#### **Setting Up Your Public Figure Author/Writer Page**

Once you feel confident, separate from your private personal page you can set up a public figure page as a writer. Do this before you log in, from the Facebook homepage where you started your personal page. You will need to select the type of page it will be and you can give it a different title/label from your personal page. If you use the same private details to set it up, it will become linked to your personal page. Then you will be able to toggle between both pages whenever you log in.

The difference with your public writer page is that people don't send friend requests to it. Instead they click 'like' or 'follow' to be able to see the content on it. You can invite your friends to like the page, plus anyone else from the public can access it if they search for you. Having a public writer page enables you to keep separate what you share with close friends and family, from what you share with your reader audience.

When you post some news on your public page you will likely see a question from Facebook inviting you to 'boost' your post in order to get more people to see it. This is an opportunity to pay for some advertising if you want to increase the chances of the public seeing your post.

#### **Hosting An Event**

If you are hosting an event such as a book launch you can click on Facebook's 'create event' option. You can do this as yourself from your personal page or you can do this as your public page identity. To create it is like creating an invitation. Just fill in the boxes. It's helpful to have a look at someone else's event page first to get an idea of what you can do. You have options as to who you wish to invite.

#### **Creating Your Own Group Page**

If you're up for it you can create your own writers group page if you want to. Group pages can be public which means anyone can see the content or they can be kept 'closed' or 'secret' which means only the joined members of the group can see the content on the group page and comment on it.

#### **How To Avoid Scams**

The not-so-smiley side of the internet is the risk of being tricked or scammed. There's a high chance someone will try to do this to you. But if you know how to recognise it, you can protect yourself. There seems to be two main motives behind the fakers. Either they're trying to make money or they're trying to see how far their post will go. There are many kinds of internet scams including online romance, fake business investment, fake winnings, fake security emails, and scammers posing as someone else, often someone famous or someone you know.

#### **Fake Posts**

Before you share someone else's post, for example a fundraiser for a sick child, click on the picture and view who originally started it. Check the date it started and the comments below. Some posts have been travelling from person to person for years. Keep in mind just because a famous person is quoted it doesn't guarantee it's genuine. I saw an example recently, which was a prayer request about a tragedy, but it wasn't valid. There are all kinds of imaginative fake posts travelling around the internet. Be wary unless verified beyond doubt.

It's good to think carefully and pray before sharing a post which has been written in a way to 'guilt trip' people into passing it on. Posts can be masked as intending to help people but suggest a negative connotation or judgement for those who don't share it. Or they sound like a horoscope foretelling your future if you do or don't share it. I encourage you only to share something because you feel the Lord wants you to, not because you're concerned about other people's judgements of you. There are plenty of encouraging posts which uplift others and don't carry negatively implied wording.

#### **Fake Profiles**

Watch out for fake profiles. Any information you supply on the internet publicly can be copied by someone else, including photographs. A scammer can create a fake new personal page with your friend's photograph and name on it. Then they will send you a friend request. This can happen through the Messenger app as well as through Facebook. Keep in touch with friends by reliable means such as phone if you're in doubt.

If a well-known public figure sends you a friend-request, be suspicious. No, it's unlikely Joyce Meyer is sending you a personal friend-request. She has an official public page for her ministry and if she does have a personal page, I bet she wisely keeps it for only her closest family and friends.

#### **Dealing with Scammers**

When you realise a scammer is trying to make contact, you don't have to accept their friend request or conversation request. You can report it by selecting from options in the message box which alert Facebook to the problem. Just read the options carefully

and select the appropriate answers. The more scammers get exposed and caught out the more Facebook can deal with them. It's good to alert your friends about the scam. Do not reply to scammers. Whether it's through social media or through email—it's best to avoid them. Avoid opening their attachments or links. Lately, scammers have been targeting our NZ Christian Writers web page and sending out fake emails or Messenger profiles, pretending to be one of us urgently needing money. Please do not respond.

#### **Protecting Yours and Others' Information**

Another thing to be aware of are tricks to get you to supply your personal information or someone else's. For example a fun and harmless-looking survey may be getting passed along from friend to friend asking—what's your favourite food, what's your middle name, what colour are your eyes? But if you answer these you may be unwittingly giving out answers to personal finance security questions or information on your drivers license. A parent may innocently give out information about one of their children.

You can control what you say but you can't control one hundred percent who will get to read it. A friend of a friend of a friend may be a scammer waiting to take advantage. If you don't want to risk becoming the target of prank phone calls, don't give out your phone number in a social media conversation, even if only other friends can see it. I knew a teenager who received a prank call and was puzzled as to how they'd got her number. I looked at her Facebook page and sure enough, she'd neglected to keep her phone number private. Our children and teenagers always need supervision and support when using the internet. If anyone tries bullying or harassment, there are options to block them.

Let's take back what the enemy is trying to steal. Technology is a great thing in the right hands, and we can use it for God's purposes. Let's get our Christian writing out there.


Over many years the author had developed a successful career as an executive coach and consultant. In 2005, however, he had a life-changing encounter with God and discovered he was living in an unfulfilled and debilitating maze called 'Almost'. Since then he has developed programmes and strategies that result in a John 10:10 life of abundance and is keen to share these with others

Eugene could have written a self-help manual, but instead he has fleshed out his ideas in the form of a modern day fable involving two main characters—Alex and Oliver, and their wives.

Alex is depicted as middle-aged, seemingly successful, but struggling with a lack of fulfilment and meaning in his life. Oliver is an older man with a similar background, but he has discovered the answer to an 'almost' existence and how a person can move out of the rut they're in and enjoy a purposeful and rewarding life.

Divine destiny brings them together and Oliver proceeds to mentor Alex and show him how his masked boredom, frustration and internal emptiness can be changed into a meaningful existence characterised by drive, determination, dedication, discipline and desire.

This book will challenge readers to evaluate their lives and possibly motivate them to implement some of the strategies Eugene outlines, and thus live the satisfying and meaningful lives God intended for them.

"That's the thing about books. They let you travel without moving your feet." Thumpa Lahiri, *The Namesake*. This is what happens when you read Jeanette's three-month journey including 16,000 kilometres along the Silk Road.

Martin and Jeanette, with their friends, Maurice and Anne O'Reilly, in twin 4X4 Nissans, Bilbo and Heehaw, drove for three months from Hong Kong to Denmark through China, Central Asia and Eastern Europe. Twelve months of preparation preceded their embarking on an adventure which Jeanette shares with clarity, humour and honesty.


After four days' delay caused by 'frustrating bureaucracy' at the port in Shenzhen, their vehicles were released. They were now behind schedule. They began their journey north to Xian, the fascinating first leg of their adventure.

Jeanette's gift of noticing detail, and her ability to weave myriads of information into her narrative, create an exciting, as-if-you-were-with-them, experience. We meet 'friendly and delightful' people, visit interesting sites, and learn how to buy diesel on the black market. Their journey culminated in Denmark where Martin's family lives

#### Letters in a Different War

The subject of conscientious objectors during wartime has always been controversial. Some people regarded them as courageous individuals who were prepared to stand up for their convictions regardless of cost. Others, especially those who supported the taking up of arms, viewed them as cowards and treated them and their families with contempt.

The book is fictitious, but the author has based her story on facts and personal information she has derived from close family members caught up in this dilemma in the past. The story is set in a typical urban community during 1942 when New Zealand was facing a potential invasion by the Japanese. The main character is a young girl named Beverley who lives next door to a conscientious objector and his family. When he's taken away to a detention camp, Beverley observes the different reactions of neighbours and friends and sees the hardship and public scorn experienced by those left behind.

Letters between conscientious objectors and their loved ones was restricted and heavily censored—hence the title. The author doesn't attempt to persuade the reader, but seeks to portray the dynamics of the situation and what made someone swim against the tide of public opinion for the sake of conscience, and at considerable cost. I felt this book throws new light on a subject which is seldom talked about nowadays. As one of the characters concludes: 'There's more than one kind of courage.'



#### Soaring Out of the Darkness

Growing up in a dysfunctional, broken family, Staci often felt unloved, unwanted and abandoned. At 14 she tasted alcohol and was immediately addicted. 'With the stepping stones of shattered self-esteem, depression, feelings of inadequacy and a generous helping of family genetics set in place, my path to addiction was an all-too-easy one to follow.'

For the next 10 years Staci's life spiralled downwards into self-destruction due to drunkenness, immorality, loneliness, depression and self-loathing. When suicide seemed the only way out, Staci cried out to God and a small seed of hope was planted within her. She gave up alcohol, started attending church and, in time, became a Christian.

Although Staci knew Jesus offered complete forgiveness, she struggled to forgive herself and others. But the knowledge that God's grace is unearned and undeserved set Staci on the right path towards true freedom, emotional healing and recovery.

Staci tells her story with honesty and transparency in the hope it will help others. I recommend her small book to anyone who is struggling with life's challenges and problems and doesn't know where to turn.

She concludes: 'God is not the creator of our prison, but He will rescue us when we trust Him, accept Him, and take action to step into His freedom'.

Often the topics and genres provide an opportunity to try something new. Contestants receive individual feedback from our experienced judges.

Please note that previously the place-getters' individual critiques from judges were published but from now on they will only be emailed privately to the individual contestants. We will only be publishing the judges' general comments for each level.

There are points allocated for place-getters in every magazine edition for every level. Points earned are: 15 points for first, 12 points for second and 9 points for third. At the end of the year contestants' points are added up so end-of-year prizes for first, second and third can be awarded in each level. The end of year monetary prizes are \$60 for First Place, \$50 for Second Place and \$40 for Third place.

Entries are judged on the following:

- Entering, Format and Layout 15% (These requirements are on the inside, final page of the magazine).
- Requirements 25% (Pay attention to the instruction details for the topic you've been assigned).
- Creativity, flow and impact 25% (Test your entry by reading it aloud).
- Grammar and Punctuation 25% (Study examples from good publishers; computers and proof readers can help too).
- Spelling 10% (A dictionary is an essential tool for a writer).

Contestants must be current members of NZCW and 16 years or over. The idea is to earn your way from Level One in steps up to Level Three.

- 1. **Level One** is for new members and all other members who haven't yet competed enough to be promoted to Level Two.
- 2. **Level Two** is for members who have been promoted by the judges up from Level One.
- 3. **Level Three** is for members who have been promoted by the judges up from Level Two and is open to members who are on the NZCW Honours List. The Honours List can be found on our website.

To be promoted by the judges to the next level, a contestant must achieve enough placings and supply consistent quality entries throughout the year. Entries must demonstrate the contestant has been learning from the critiques and improving over a period of time.

Below is how our current points board stands for 2019 so far. It's not too late to get your name on this leader board. Check out the next competition topics on the inside final page of the magazine and have a go. To all who have entered so far—great work and keep sending in your entries—anything could happen as the points aren't too far apart!

## **Competition Results**

#### **Level One**

Judge: Debbie McDermott

**Requirement:** Write a glowing tribute to someone who has been a positive role model in your life, particularly in relation to your Christian walk. 350 words maximum.

#### **General Comments**

I received several good entries to this competition. Each entrant met the requirements very well by writing passionately about someone who has been a life-changing role model in their lives. Each entry was also well-written and a pleasure to read. This made judging and selecting the winners of this competition a bit difficult.

I finally awarded Kathryn Drinkwater First Place for making the best use of the limited word count and submitting a 100% grammatically correct entry.

I awarded new member Adeline Hill Second Place for being the only entrant to address her tribute directly **to** her role model (which was a requirement of the competition topic), rather than just writing **about** him. Apart from a couple of minor grammar, punctuation and spelling errors, her writing is excellent and she went to the extra effort of including an end note of scripture references. While this was not necessary, it makes her entry a contemplative devotional as well as a tribute.

After much consideration and re-reading their entries, I decided to award Sara McGuire and Taryn Dryfhout Third Place Equal. Apart from a few minor mistakes, their tributes are beautifully written and worthy of publication.

While few mistakes were made by entrants, there are three key areas for improvement:

#### 1. Keep commas to a bare minimum

An overuse of commas interrupts the flow of writing as well as slows down the pace of a story. This is because a comma tells the reader to pause when in many instances it is not necessary to do so, particularly if you keep your sentences reasonably short instead of long and drawn out. Remember, too, that there is usually no need to put a comma before a conjunction such as 'and'. One of the ways in which to check if you have too many commas is to read your work aloud.

#### 2. Hyphens vs long dashes

In several instances, (such as: '...emotionally - and can still feel her imprint on my life') a hyphen was used instead of a long em (—) dash. A hyphen should only be used for compound words preceding a noun (e.g. a faith-filled life), or to split a word over two sentences.

MS Word should automatically create a long em dash when you IMMEDIATELY insert two hyphens, then IMMEDIATELY type the next word followed by a space. If it doesn't, go to your Replace menu and type a hyphen into the 'Find what?' line. Then move your cursor to the 'Replace with?' line, use your mouse to click on the More>> option, click on the down arrow in 'Special' and select 'Em Dash'. NB: The shorter en dash option is usually used in lists of numbers (e.g. 1860 – 1880).

#### 3. Incorrect or missing words

One incorrect or missing word can change the entire meaning of a sentence, so be diligent in carefully proofreading your work before submitting it. Reading it aloud, or listening to it being read back to you, is also a sure way of identifying such errors.

I would once again like to congratulate all those who entered this competition. While it was not possible to award you all a place, each of you made a wonderful effort and I look forward to receiving more entries from you.

# Level Two Judge: Janice Gillgren

**Requirement:** 'A day at the park.' Write a nostalgic story on this theme. It can be based on a true event or be entirely fictional, but should be believable and have an inviting title and strong ending. Use clear, descriptive language. 500 words.

#### **General Comments**

Nostalgia is more than just remembering an event. It is a wistful, sentimental or bittersweet yearning (or homesickness) for situations, people or conditions of our past. This required a particular approach in the way the story was written and was a primary requirement. Only the first-place entry achieved this requirement reasonably well, so the other entries were critiqued on the remaining requirements.

As your stories could be fictional or true, my critiques won't deal with what I think they are. The stories were all believable, so that was good. Grammar and punctuation were generally well done, and the word counts were all good.

It is important not to clutter up your story, whether it is with a detailed list of things that happen, or with a detailed account of an emotional experience. Either of these extremes will obscure any plot you have.

Stories, whether fictional or true, need a balance of characterisation and plot to hold attention. These two aspects don't need to be in a 50/50 balance, but they do both need to be evident. Each of us tends to be stronger in one of these areas and has to work harder at the other aspect.

'Keep your sentences short!' is a frequent admonition to writers today. However, variation in sentence length is also important, so what should you aim for? It depends. Rather than just looking at how many words you should fit into a sentence (or paragraph, as the same advice applies), think instead about the effect you are trying to achieve by them.

A lot of short sentences create a snappy effect well suited to high-action plots and dialogue, but don't suit the moody description of a stormy beach or lovers walking along a moonlit lane. Vary your sentences within a range that seems appropriate to what you want to write and have some that are longer or shorter than that range.

Characterisation is similarly affected by sentence length. If you want to describe a laid-back or elderly person, for example, using lots of short sentences seems out of place. Likewise, longer passages won't suit the depiction of a busy little toddler.

Grammar and punctuation were mostly well done, though there were some mistakes that could be easily seen with a thorough check-over, and most writing programs, such as Word, automatically highlight spelling and grammatical errors.

A problem seen in one entry was of paragraphs being far too long. Although each paragraph was reasonably well based on one mini-theme, breaking those blocks of words down into smaller paragraphs would improve their appeal on the page, as well as their readability. One way to do this is to create a new paragraph for each speaker (whether dialogue with God or with another person).

One of the best lessons I learned early on was to start the writing project in plenty of time to scrutinise my work carefully before sending it. This often requires some period of time to let it 'rest' and re-read it. Mistakes are much more easily seen then.

# Level Three Judge: Julia Martin

**Requirement:** Choose an old style hymn (pre-1900) and re-write it retaining rhyme, rhythm and meaning. Provide a copy of both. (36 lines maximum).

#### **General Comments**

This was not an easy assignment and I applaud the three members who attempted it. Most hymns written prior to 1900 have words and expressions that are not used in modern times. While the old hymns may have dignity and poetic excellence, their meaning may be lost on the younger generation.

It was a matter, therefore, of understanding the meaning of the old hymn and then transforming the lyrics into more contemporary language while still retaining the rhyme and rhythm of the original piece. This meant the number of beats in each line of the hymn must be consistent, otherwise the lyrics will not match the tune and the hymn will be difficult to sing. The rhyming pattern at the end of the lines of each stanza must be consistent as well e.g. abab.
