




Interview with Rosie Boom, Author of the Barn Chronicles series














Recently I interviewed
Rosie Boom, New
Zealand author of the
Barn Chronicles. The
following is what Rosie
shared with Young
Christian Writer
magazine readers:





QUESTION:

1. How old were you when you discovered you liked writing?

ANSWFR:

When I was nine and living in Papua, New Guinea, I had an accident that left me in bed for a few weeks. During this time, my mother showed me a writing competition for Australia and New Guinea and suggested I enter it. I did and was lucky enough to win first prize – a first edition copy of Tolkien's *The Fellowship of the Ring*.

QUESTION:

2. What inspired the content of your books?

ANSWER:

Real life in the Boom household has been the inspiration for most of my books.

QUESTION:

3. How did you remember your life details? Did you refer back to diaries?

ANSWFR:

Writing *The Barn Chronicles* I relied heavily on my diary, which I had been diligent in keeping. Anything funny one of the children said, any dramas were duly written down, so it was all there when I came to write the books. I can't encourage people enough to write things down when they happen!! It's so easy to forget things, even memorable things that we presume we will never forget. I find it's important to write down even the smallest details – they will in fact be the things that make your writing believable.

QUESTION:

4. How long did it take you to write your first book and the series?

ANSWER:

Where Lions Roar at Night took five months to write. The following three books all took longer than that – ranging from eight months to a year and a half. Illustrating them was also a long process!

QUESTION:

5. What kinds of places have you visited or been a speaker at, due to your role as an author?

ANSWER:

It's amazing what doors open to you as an author. I've spoken to hundreds of children at schools, including the delightful children at a closed brethren school where I had to be careful not to mention television or movies etc. I've spoken to people on trains, in ships and on planes. I think most people hide a deep wistful longing inside to maybe try their hand at writing someday, so they're fascinated to talk to you and ask you questions.

QUESTION:

6. Is there anything else you'd like to share with young Christian writers?

ANSWER:


If you're keen to be a writer, keep your eyes and ears open! Each day, you'll come across all manner of things that can help you write a fantastic book if you're listening and watching for them. For example, I met the man at our local dump and realised he sniffs exactly six times before he speaks.
That small mannerism will find its way into one of my books sometime. Study people on the bus, at the airport, in the shopping mall. Record what you see.


And read, read, read. When you find a book that you love, think about why you love it. I've just done that myself with a children's book I stumbled across called *The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane* by Kate de Camillo. Beautiful. Why did it move me? What was it that swept me into the story? Why did I care about Edward and each of the characters?


And lastly, just keep writing. You'll get better with every story, every poem, every attempt at sharing something with your readers. Never give up!


Interview with Janet Pointon, Author of The Invisible Caravan










Recently I interviewed Janet Pointon, New Zealand author, about her new book, *The Invisible Caravan*. Read what Janet shared with *Young Christian Writer* magazine:





QUESTION:

1. How old were you when you discovered you liked writing?

ANSWER:

I have always made up stories. I still have one I wrote when I was seven or eight.

QUESTION:

2. What inspired the content of your book, *The Invisible Caravan*?

ANSWFR:

I decided it was possible to write a children's book which would be exciting but not give sleepless nights. I tried to expand the reader's thinking into a spiritual dimension without their realising it. I'm amazed at the number of adults who enjoy reading the book.

QUESTION:

3. How did you plan out and create your story?

ANSWFR:

I write as I read. I need to keep writing to see what happens! Eventually I stop and ask myself questions about the characters and fill in the finer details.

QUESTION:

4. How long did it take you to write your book?

ANSWER:

It didn't take long but I needed to go over it several times to flesh it out a bit more. I also tightened up the sentences to cut out unnecessary words.

QUESTION:

5. What kinds of places have you visited or been a speaker at, due to your role as an author?

ANSWER:

I had a book launch but this is the only time I have publicly promoted the book.

QUESTION:

6. Is there anything else you'd like to share with Young Christian writers?

ANSWER:

Keep reading. Keep writing and enter as many competitions as you can.

Writing a Great Rhyming Poem

Here are some tips to remember when creating a rhyming poem:

- Ensure the words do actually rhyme and don't just look the same. Keep in mind
 different cultures pronounce certain words differently. For example, dance in
 the U.S.A. would rhyme with ants whereas in NZ dance would rhyme with
 aunts.
- Check the rhythm by reading your lines out loud. Try to be consistent with the length of the number of beats in your lines.
- Think of ways to re-word your phrase to express the thought you are trying to convey while at the same time keeping the correct rhythm. Often removing one small word won't alter your communication but will improve the rhythm.
- Read your poem to another writer and ask them to give you feedback. Then
 ask them to read your poem to you. Take note if they struggle with any words
 or the rhythm.
- Try counting the syllables in the line but keep in mind some syllables in words
 are spoken faster than others and some syllables in a word naturally carry an
 accent which can change your rhythm. For some people, clapping their hands
 or beating a drum is helpful. Take care to listen as you read it and note how
 each word affects your poem's rhythm.
- Read other people's poetry out loud, including children's books which rhyme.
 Pay attention to what works well and what doesn't. There are three poems included in this magazine read them and ask yourself what you enjoyed about each one and what each writer could have done better.
- Use interesting words and be passionate. Poetry is a great way to have something to say and be heard.
- Try using a rhyming dictionary to assist you in finding words that rhyme or try an internet search.

INVENTION OF PRINTING

Can you imagine a world without books, magazines, newspapers — or any other form of printed material? Well, that's how it was for most people until about 600 years ago. Books had to be written by hand, so they were scarce and valuable. Only the rich could afford to own them and book collections were usually found in churches and monasteries where they were often chained to tables.

In the 1400s, a young German named Johann Gutenberg made an amazing discovery. A friend gave him a piece of carved wood wrapped in parchment. When he unwrapped the carving, he discovered the sap from the carving had made an imprint on the parchment.

Gutenberg was excited at the possibilities. For many years he had developed a great love of learning but was frustrated by the shortage of books available for ordinary people to read. Moreover, as a Christian, he longed for a way to spread the Word of God to all people.

Previously some books had been produced by block printing which involved carving raised letters into a block of wood. The block was inked and pressed onto paper but could print only one page. The method was useless for book making, as the carving of each block took so much time and effort.

With his new idea, Gutenberg set to work in secret. He wanted to perfect a form of movable type whereby individual letters made out of metal could be arranged into text and fitted into a press. Once inked and pressed onto paper, hundreds of copies could be printed at once. The type could then be taken apart and rearranged quickly for the next page. It took many long hours of trial and error before he developed a system that worked.

News of Gutenberg's movable type and printing press invention spread quickly throughout Europe, and in less than 50 years, 15 million books had come into existence. Knowledge and ideas could now be shared quickly and there's no doubt that Gutenberg's invention paved the way for the Protestant Reformation and the Renaissance in Europe.

The Bible was the first book Gutenberg printed. In 1455, he printed about 200 copies in the Latin language. The few copies remaining today are considered priceless as the Gutenberg Bible is still regarded as a masterpiece of the printer's art.

Gutenberg's invention opened the way for the mass production of Bibles which helped the spread of Christianity. To this day more copies of the Bible have been printed in the world than any other book.

Johann Gutenberg used his God-given talent to make a difference – and so can you!
