

Confused About Editing?

For more than a decade I've been publishing books for other people. Time and again writers are confused about the editing process.

What is an editor? Do I really need one? What do they do? How much do they cost? What's the difference between structural and copy editing, and proofreading?



It is absolutely vital that all work is professionally edited. Sometimes writers tell me they have had their manuscript 'professionally' edited but I soon find mistakes galore and have to re-edit it myself. Often this is because of a writer's confusion about what sort of editing has taken place.

Let me clarify.

- 1. **A GOOD MANUSCRIPT.** The writer needs to work hard at a manuscript until it is as good as he/she can present it, that is, through self-editing.
- READERS. The manuscript should be handed to several people for comment, people who know something about writing. Feedback from peers is essential, and we need to be humble enough to receive both the negative as well as the positive comments, altering our script accordingly.
- CRITIQUE. Gaining an overall critique of a manuscript is valuable. The 'readers'
 may do some of this but, as a publisher, I usually offer an author a brief overall
 constructive critique of their work, in terms of producing a book for public
 consumption. Some editors will do this, for a fee.
- 4. **STRUCTURAL** (or developmental) EDIT. Sometimes this is worked on with the author during the actual writing of the book, especially if it's a novel.

Is the structure of the book well organised? Is it likely to keep the reader interested? Do the chapters flow on from one another? Is the content presented in a way that will keep the reader interested? Does it fit the target audience? Is it the right title? Should some material form an appendix? What about the tone and style? Is the material marketable? With a novel, characterisation, plot, setting and other factors could be discussed under 'structure'.

Some writers become upset at this process but they need to realise that an editor/publisher is looking at their work in terms of a finished book that will sell. No manuscript is perfect, whatever the author might think!

In collaboration with the author a publisher will suggest changes aimed to improve the book's readability.

5. **COPY EDIT.** After the publisher and author have worked through structural considerations then it's time for a copy edit.

This involves a sentence-by-sentence analysis of grammar, spelling, word choice, awkward phrasing, tenses, paragraphing, repetition, punctuation, inconsistencies, capitalisation... all in order to make the script readable. An editor does not change an author's ideas, but helps them flow better.

Most professional editors use a red mark-up system, with comments. Some may simply mark a hard copy.

The author may or may not accept the suggested changes.

Copy editing is an important process. Before a manuscript is paginated there need to be as few errors as possible. It can become quite expensive to correct a lot of mistakes once the book has been paged.

6. **PROOFREADING.** Once the book is paged (galley proofs or uncorrected proofs) it is PROOFREAD preferably by someone other than the author, although he/she can do so as well.

It's confusing to use the word 'proofreading' for just a close reading of the original manuscript.

A proofreader carefully looks for any mistakes that have occurred in the process of paging the book, such as poor syllabification of a word at the end of the line, wrong page numbers, 'orphans and widows', and captions for photos. Sometimes copy errors are also found.

So, when a publisher asks you if your manuscript has been professionally edited he/she wants to know (i) if its structure has been carefully considered, and (ii) if it has been thoroughly checked for punctuation, grammar etc.

Ensure you know exactly what aspect of your manuscript is being edited when you present it. Some editors will do both while others will do only one of them – which may mean paying twice!

The whole aim of good editing is to help your text flow better – quality control. This is something you really shouldn't attempt yourself.

But still I can trust though my tears may fall


For my life is in God's hand Though now my heart is heavy with pain, Yet, one day I'll understand.

Second Son - Inception

Second Son - Inception is the first in a five-book series. The series follows two key characters over 30 years: their trials, triumphs and the eventual selection of one of them to become the single world leader.


Providing the foundation for the subsequent books, *Inception* tells the story of Sven Granger, a dedicated believer and head of research and development at the Government Obstetrics Department (G.O.D.) who is involved in medical research. Although strongly against abortion, his beliefs and relationships are challenged by the medical, moral and spiritual aspects of human cloning.

Granger's protagonist is Senator Prevari, a career politician, Grand Wizard, coven head and proabortionist and the driving force behind creating the first human clone.

As the spiritual realm reveals itself through the book, Granger and his team are hurled into spiritual warfare. Angelic forces galvanised by prayers of faith confront the demonic who possess and protect their followers to bring about Satan's second son of perdition.

The beginning of the book has a list of the people and angels on God's team, and the people and demonic on Lucifer's team. As the drama of this story increased, I found this a welcome addition to the book to refresh my memory of who was who.

The series, *Second Son*, is based on truths gained from the personal lives of the author and others. *Inception* is a dramatic and fast-moving story that I couldn't stop reading.

With our finite minds, it's not easy to grasp the fact that the God of the universe would orchestrate incidents in our everyday lives that show his presence, love and concern for his people.

In this small book, Lesley shares what she calls 'God moments'. She describes incidents and encounters with people she's met over the years, often while out walking or traveling by public transport, both here and overseas.

She recognizes a common thread running through these episodes. At times she has been in just the right place and time to meet the need of another person, while on other occasions the reverse has happened, and she's been on the receiving end of help and encouragement she needed.

While sceptics may dismiss these encounters as random chance or coincidence, Lesley has lived the Christian life long enough to recognize God's perfect timing and intervention in her everyday life.

Lesley has found God often works in unexpected places and through the most unlikely people. She notes: 'The God of the unexpected doesn't take conventional pathways'.

The course was facilitated by Aver Ministries with presenter Kerri Price who has been writing and speaking for 20 years. She is an exceptional speaker and is well-respected in both church and community circles.

The course covered an in-depth framework on how to write a book, the pros and cons of traditional versus self-publishing, a comprehensive marketing plan and an excellent unit on social media by Sina Steele.

It was remarkably rich in content, creatively delivered and professionally led from start to finish while keeping us completely captivated the whole way through. It is the perfect course for beginners, those with little experience and it is still valuable for those with a few books under their belts.

Rebekah's Diary

I didn't sleep a wink last night. It's hardly surprising as so much has happened in the last few hours.

Yesterday started out as normal. I rose early, carried out my usual mundane chores, and then later in the day I returned to the spring to draw water for the household.

At the well I suddenly sensed company and there behind me were strangers – an older man accompanied by servants with ten camels loaded with goods.

The older man approached me and politely asked for a drink of water. As I gave him a drink, I noticed the state of the camels. They'd obviously travelled a long way and were desperate for water. On impulse, I offered to water the camels as well. This was a huge undertaking and I was conscious that the older man was watching my every movement.

When the job was completed, the man asked whose daughter I was and if there was room in my father's house for the night. I told him whose family I belonged to and assured him that there would be a room and food for them all. With that, he pulled out a gold nose ring and two beautiful gold bracelets and gave them to me.

I dropped my jar and ran on ahead to tell my family what had happened. My brother Laban, seeing my jewellery and hearing my story, hurried out to meet the group at the well. He brought them back to our home and offered them hospitality.

Before eating their meal, the older man paused to explain his mission.

He spoke of his master Abraham who was a relative of our family; describing his wealth and possessions and the fact of his son's birth in their old age and how this son required a wife to carry on the family line. He explained how the wife must come from his family clan and not from a local Canaanite family because Isaac was the chosen line through which God would create a nation that would be a blessing to the entire world.

Listening in the background, it occurred to me that I was the one chosen by God to be part of His plan. My father and brother were pleased to accept the proposal as they also saw it as God's will. The older man brought out gold and silver jewellery and articles of clothing for me, and costly gifts for my brother and mother. The man bowed down to the ground before the Lord and claimed his prayers had been answered and the deal completed.

This morning the visitors arose and planned to set off immediately, taking me with them. But it was all too soon. All so rushed. My family could see my distress and asked that I stay for at least ten days, as there was so much to plan and prepare.

The older man declined and said they must leave today to return to their master 900 kms away.

My family called me and asked, "Will you go with this man today?" With my mind in a turmoil, I reasoned with myself.

'What if I don't like the man I must marry? Will I ever see my family and friends again?

It's all too much, but do I really have a choice? I could say 'no'. I could play for time and feign an illness or accident. And yet – it's obviously God's will for my life. The boxes are all ticked and there are too many coincidences for this whole plan to be a matter of chance or fate.

So that's it. I've made up my mind. I will trust in my God and throw caution to the wind. I'll say 'yes' and I'll leave today – come what may. I'll go with them and become this man's wife – for better or for worse!



The Publishing Journey of Annie Browne

(Also known as Glennis Browne)

I came into this world with a fire in my belly to write. As a child, I wrote in a school exercise book, twelve chapters about a fictional girl; Beth, the orphan. I wish I had kept that exercise book. My books are on similar themes -



feeling the pain of unfair treatment and women being second class citizens. Their emotional struggles and drive to change the way life is, is the theme throughout.

In the late 1990s, when I lived in Kerikeri, Northland, I began researching my family background on ancestry sites. My husband and I moved to Australia to live closer to our children who now had children. We bought a caravan and explored the country, travelling to places that I'd discovered were where my great grandparents had lived. Once I returned home, I researched further, finding information of which my parents were unaware. I knew my grandmother had been born at Coalville in Victoria in 1898.

After ancestry researches of births, deaths, marriages and newspaper clippings, it became apparent a story was waiting to be shared.

My writing experience began. I knew nothing about publishing and didn't have a social media presence. A vanity press company were happy to take my money and stepped me through the publishing process. The first book somehow missed the editing process. I'd edited as best I could, but on seeing my printed book discovered how terrible my grammar was. The company agreed they had not performed the job I had paid them for and decided to re-edit and re-publish. I shortened and reformed the chapters before I submitted it.

I'd learnt a lot by now, having signed up for two editing programmes online. I used the vanity press to publish my second novel as I'd paid for it while in the buzz of working on both books in the series. My social media presence was developing as were my skills creating artwork from photographs on the computer. I made my first web page. Now I was into publicity, which hasn't helped my sales a lot.

My first royalty payment was for \$99 Australian earned predominantly by buying stock, which I sold at weekend stalls and to friends. I was giving away a lot – all good for promotion. Author friends were telling me self-publishing was now in vogue. This required patience and perseverance and skill development on the computer. I discovered a self-publishing company with a simple programme making it easy. Cover production followed, and a friend skilled in graphic and video production took up the challenge.

I re-published the first two books, changing their names and used a pen name, to differentiate from the vanity press books. I began book three. We returned to New Zealand to live and after two years of settling in it was time to finish book three and four, as my faithful readers were asking about them, having had a long wait.

Now, book three is published, following a pre-release campaign on Amazon in February 2021. Book four is at the stage of revision and editing. The set should be completed mid-2021.

I've learnt about the advantages of single markets and going wide. Marketing and promotion continue including producing short videos and using social media. Building followers using posts and comments is a daily activity.

I have also learnt via several social media writing courses. My favourite writing skills came from Grammarly Premium and Autocrit, where sentence structure and comma usage began to make sense.

Will I write more books in the future? Without a doubt I will.


About the books:

Annie Browne explores the excesses, attitudes, hopes and aspirations of Australian and New Zealand families during the late 1800s. The first two historical novels in the series are *Bitter-Sweet Lives* and *Power and Authority*. The third book is *Temperance*. The fourth book, completing the series is *Secrets* to be published mid-2021.

Annie Browne lives in New Zealand with her husband, Shih Tzu puppy, (also Annie) and is the proud parent of two adult sons, a delightful daughter-in-law and two wonderful grandsons. Over many years the author has researched families and

Tottie, who appreciates the advantages of living close to her parents and siblings, struggles accepting life living away from them. Dan's upbringing has been different from hers, and he is restless. Friction builds, creating raw emotions and problems that need resolving.



When Book Two ends, you are left wondering whether

Tottie will accept Dan's decision to leave Coalville and migrate to New Zealand. It appears to be a hopeless goal for Daniel to achieve as Tottie has become a headstrong woman who knows what she wants.

We begin Book Three on New Year's Eve as the cuckooclock chimes away the final minutes of the 1800s. The year of 1899 rolls over starting the new millennium. What lies ahead for the family?

Become lost in the world of change, tension, tears, and war, joining Tottie as she overcomes her insecurities.

Then, look out for the story's conclusion – *Secrets* will be published in 2021.

Competition Results

Level One

Judge: Debbie McDermott

Requirement: Write a modern chorus or hymn relating to Jesus' death and resurrection. You may use an existing tune or write your own music if you prefer. The music score should be included with your entry, together with an MP3 recording if you have written your own music. (4 verses maximum, with a repeated refrain or bridge counted as 1 verse)

General Comments

Congratulations to the two people who entered and did very well in this competition. First Place went to Rob Lake for his moving contemporary chorus on the freedom Jesus won for us at the Cross. Also included with his entry was the music he wrote to accompany the song on a guitar, plus a good recording of it being played and sung. This enabled me to hear the melody and tempo of the piece (two important aspects I could not determine from the music which only consisted of chords) and I found both to be excellent. Apart from being easy to sing, Rob's song also has a powerful takeaway message. Hopefully, he will seek to share it with many and perhaps even record it professionally so it can have a far-reaching impact.

I awarded Second Place to Liz Fitzmaurice for her rousing Easter hymn which is to be sung to the marching music originally written for 'The People's Song' (otherwise known as 'Do you Hear the People Sing?'), and sung in the epic film and stage production, 'Les Miserables'. The chorus in Liz's hymn is particularly good, but there are some minor issues with tempo in the verses. I have discussed this with Liz in the critique I sent to her.

When writing a song to someone else's music, it is very important to:

- 1. Compare the words of the music writer's original song with your own, to ensure your syllable counts and stressed syllables/words are the same as theirs. Wrong syllable counts and/or incorrect placing of emphases can make it difficult to fit the words to the original music and make the song tricky to sing as a result.
- 2. Obtain or download the original sheet music with the words included, to determine how many notes there are to each bar in the top melody staff and how the words of the original song fit to each bar and each note. If you are familiar with how to read music, the sheet music will also tell you what the tempo is, at the beginning of the piece. For instance, the tempo of 'The People's Song' is 12/8, meaning each alternate bar contains 12 beats and 8 beats respectively.

While competition assignments like this one can be difficult for writers who are not poets or lyricists, I do encourage you to rise to the challenge and submit an entry anyway. Besides being an excellent exercise in learning how to tighten up your writing and creatively say a lot in just a few words, you may also discover you have a hidden talent.

Level Two

Judge: Lesley Edgeler

Requirement: Write a new, modern parable or allegory that young teenagers can relate to. Ensure you use appropriate language and imagery that will clearly convey the Christian message you want to clearly get across to this age group. (450 words)

General Comments

Meaningful imagery, dialogue and illustrations from everyday life are all major components of parables or allegories. When writing parables human characters are essential. If animals become the main focus the stories then become fables as in those written by Aesop.

Parables, like stories, need a beginning, a middle and a conclusion. They must teach a lesson or have a take-away moral for the reader to contemplate, and if appropriate, take action.

In his book, The Parables: Understanding What Jesus Meant, author Gary Inrig writes 'The Lord's parables bring encouragement because in them we meet ourselves and our God. They were nearly always told to answer a question or address a particular situation.' (The Parables: Understanding What Jesus Meant, Discovery house 1991 pp7,8.)

For young teenagers the language should be clear and concise, relating to current issues or life lessons, exciting and challenging.

Jill Clarke's entry gained first place for impact, flow and her use of language teens will relate to. Her modern-day rendition of the Good Samaritan struck me as exactly what was needed for this competition.

I awarded second place to Ella Hamlin as her main character faces up to his responsibility for causing his friend to stay out of the surfing competition. Both boys wait for the competition to be over and the time seems interminable. Yet a pleasant surprise awaits them for their honesty.

Third place-getter, Pauline Marshall's clever contrast between a modern GPS and God's Global positioning system reflects different attitudes and their domino effects.

All entries received were well-written but these three stood out.

While the majority of parables and allegories are usually short and impactful, readers would also enjoy full-length versions such as John Bunyan's the Pilgrim's Progress. Bunyan cleverly uses metaphors and abstract arguments as Christian and his companions find their way to the Celestial City amidst trials and trickery.

The Alchemist by Paulo Coelho is a magical story of Santiago, an Andalusian shepherd boy who longs to search for treasure. Both stories teach object lessons and the consequences of good and bad decisions.

Contestants are encouraged to keep on entering competitions so as to enable them to improve their writing skills and find out which particular genre suits their writing abilities. Keep up the good work everyone!

Sometimes he lets us get a bit stuck because he wants to help us out of it. He wants to give us direction in life. His son, Jesus Christ, made it possible for this kind of relationship by taking the penalty for our mess-ups when he died on the cross and miraculously rose to life again. We get to know complete forgiveness and experience life to the full. But – and here's our part – we need to let go of thinking our own way is best and invite him to take charge. Start to trust his GPS. In fact Jesus calls himself 'the way, the truth and the life', so he's really the answer to everything we ever have to face, eh?

Level Three

Judge: Julia Martin

Requirement: : Imagine you are one of the soldiers ordered to guard the tomb where the body of Jesus was laid. Write a first-hand account of your experience including the aftermath. (400 words maximum)

General Comments

This assignment required a thorough reading of the historical account concerning the experience of the soldiers ordered to guard the tomb where the body of Jesus laid, as recorded in the gospel of Matthew.

As the entrants were asked to give an account of the resurrection event from the point of view of one of the soldiers present, the story needed to be told in the first person voice. The main character is therefore referred to as 'I' as opposed to the third person voice where the pronoun 'he', 'she', or 'it' can be used.

Writing in the first person has the advantage of conveying to the reader personal observations, insights, reactions, thoughts, and the emotions of the character. The reader gets the impression they are inside the character's head and they are getting a direct account of the event from a primary source. This can create an intimate and close connection between the character and the reader.

The disadvantage of using the first person voice is the fact that the writer is limited to portraying the event from the viewpoint of one person only and this may be biased or misleading.

The resurrection of Jesus Christ is the key to the Christian faith and starting with these guards and the authorities of the time, countless attempts have been made down through the ages to discredit it and cover up the indisputable evidence that God raised Jesus from the dead and that he's alive today!

In judging the competition, I looked for the following:

Factual accuracy. The story of the soldiers guarding the tomb is found only in Matthew's gospel. While it doesn't tell us everything, I expected the details in the entries to match the account recorded in Scripture.

The language used needed to convey the shock and terror the soldier experienced. This was a cataclysmic event comprising an earthquake, a dazzling mighty angel, and a dead body miraculously coming alive again. Short, sharp sentences and evocative language were therefore appropriate.

I wanted to sense a close connection with the guard as he recounts his experience – just as though he is talking directly to me.

A good conclusion is required even if the outcome for the guards is inconclusive.

I awarded first place to Shirley Jamieson because I felt she covered the above points best. By giving the characters real names, she makes the account more realistic and personal.

Caroline Cook received second place and Jean Shewan was third.

I must say I was disappointed to find inaccurate details in some of the entries, and even the omission of important features such as the earthquake, the angel, and the bribery attempts in the aftermath.

All the entries were well-written and a pleasure to read.
