MANUALS OF STYLE/STYLE GUIDES

An introduction to what they are and what they are used for

If you have ever submitted a manuscript to a publisher, you will have heard of a Style Guide. This is a document which clarifies the form of writing acceptable to the publisher and covers areas such as font size, content desired by the publication/editor, dealing with quotations and other facets of writing as diverse as grammar and page layout. For a busy publisher this is a quick efficient way of sorting manuscripts. Those that do not meet the requirements are quickly despatched to the trash—a saving of time and money for the publisher and a dreadful disappointment for the writer.

Most style guides set out the accepted style of writing in English or the official language of a country. (NB: There are differences between NZ English and US English!) A common guide used widely in the United States is *The Chicago Manual of Style* (Tauranga Christian Writers have a copy of the 16th edition published in 2010). The NZ guide is *Fit to Print – The Writing and Editing Style Guide for Aotearoa New Zealand* by Janet Hughes and Derek Wallace. (The Tauranga Writers copy was published in 2010. I haven't heard of an update!)

The New Zealand Christian Writers magazine, *The Christian Writer*, also has a style guide. However, the editorial team differ from other publishers in that they aim to encourage people to write, to express opinions, to share information about writing and to develop their writing skills. The editorial team is not paid but their goal is to publish articles to encourage writers and to print work by the members of the Collective whenever possible.

The style guide for *The Christian Writer* is in two places. Inside the front cover, the **Mission, Vision and Values** of the Collective are recorded, as well as goals of any editing carried out. Those who enter the competitions will have seen the Style Guide required for entering the competitions, usually printed on the inside of the back cover. Competition entrants who do not keep these requirements lose points and often are not placed! This is an avoidable disappointment.


Although the Editor of *The Christian Writer* is keen for people to submit writing, poems, articles and so on, we need to remember this is a voluntary role. There is no payment and the editor ('She', Kathryn at present) also has paid employment and a home to care for. Following are some suggestions to help the editor and her team of proofreaders to enrich the magazine and to ensure as many writers as possible can be published.

- 1. Choose items that bless spiritually or are helpful or stimulating in current society.
- 2. Topics clearly related to aspects of writing are always useful. A different approach to an old topic can also be useful.
- 3. Where possible, limit the submission to 500 words. (This does not completely exclude longer, in-depth articles and stories or a series published in successive magazines. If uncertain, email the editor and check.) If submitting a picture/photo make sure it is appropriate and of high quality. Most cameras these days take high-quality pictures without fancy settings.
- 4. For poetry have clear line setting out and aim to have 30 lines or fewer.
- Before submitting anything have it checked. If you belong to a local group that is an excellent place to have it evaluated. Check for punctuation and spelling errors. Ask for suggestions for improvements.
- 6. If you are not in a local group, find someone in your family, community or church whose opinion you respect. (A friend or family member who thinks you are 'the bees knees' and can do no wrong is NOT a good choice! Criticism can be a great tool for improvement.)
- 7. When you have done all you can, submit the article to the editor (editor@nzchristianwriters.org) with confidence. We will be pleased to consider it for the magazine.

It's a pleasure to read and review another selfpublished collection of meditations and spiritual insights written by someone who desires to share her Christian faith and love for the Lord.

Charlene has served alongside her husband Gary in fulltime Christian ministry for more than 50 years. Originally from America, the couple arrived in New Zealand in 1983 and for the past 25 years have lived in Dunedin where they have pastored a Baptist Church.


Charlene has named her collection of 60 devotionals 'Choices of the Heart' because she believes the choices we make today will be the life we live tomorrow.

In each devotional she starts with scripture, followed by a brief comment often drawn from her experiences in everyday life and the wisdom she has gained over the years as a follower of Jesus Christ. Many of her devotionals include short poems she has written that accompany her theme for the day, such as:

'Thank You Lord for helping me to see, The awesome one I'm created to be. Not the best or the worst, Just beautiful, one of a kind, me.'

Her meditations each day end with the challenge of a personal choice she encourages the reader to make. e.g. Today Choose 'To stand unashamedly for that which is right, and lovingly against that which is wrong.' Charlene concludes that making the right choices can bring peace for today and hope for tomorrow.

Charles E Hummel wrote a book entitled *Tyranny* of the *Urgent* in which he claimed, 'Your greatest danger is letting the urgent things crowd out the important.'

Stephen Whitwell would agree with that statement I'm sure as in this practical little book he outlines his proven 12 top tips for Christian productivity which he has gleaned from many years of busyness as a pastor, speaker, writer and administrator.


He asks the questions: Is there such a thing as Christian productivity and is God concerned about the productivity of His people? He believes the answer to both questions is 'Yes' and lists three principles on which to focus:

- Make sure God comes first.
- Make sure your heart is right.
- 3. Make sure we're doing what God wants us to do.

Stephen then outlines his top 12 productivity tips for living a productive life that is pleasing to God. There's nothing radical among them — most are common sense, practical but challenging. His tips include: Look after yourself, Limit Social Media, Say "No" more, Be flexible. He writes: 'Life is better when we're doing the things we must do; we find there's energy, passion, dreams and visions in that area, and we lose track of time'. He concludes: 'Knowing you've brought Him glory by being fruitful and productive is a great place to be'.

I believe this little book is an excellent guide for Christians from any walk of life who struggle with time management and long to get the right things done that will bring glory to God.

My Face and God

Born in 1980 into a large Catholic family in Ireland, Tracy was inflicted at an early age with a debilitating psychiatric condition called 'body dysmorphic disorder' (BDD) whereby she had a distorted perception of her appearance—notably her nose, lips and hair. This paranoia led to strange obsessive behaviour, and despite graduating from university and holding down good jobs in Ireland and later in New Zealand, alcohol and drugs became the coping mechanism for her toxic and destructive lifestyle.

Battling every problem imaginable—including eating disorders, bullying, broken relationships, depression, suicidal impulses, false religion and spiritual warfare caused Tracy to be a shattered, dysfunctional individual.

Humanly speaking Tracy's future was grim, but God had plans for her life. When she looks back on her past with hindsight, she can see His Sovereign hand slowly drawing her to Himself, often through strange and unusual means.

With honesty and immense courage she reveals her painful journey from utter brokenness to the point where she could claim: 'I was a child of God with multiple components of beauty on an emotional, mental and spiritual level.'

While her previous self-worth had been based on her distorted image, her new identity was now grounded in God Himself. It's a powerful story that will give hope and freedom to all those who are struggling and see no way out of their personal difficulties.

Is anything too hard for God? The answer is NO – and Tracy's story is proof of that!

For King and Kingdom

Born in New Zealand, Darren serves as a missionary in the Asia Pacific region.

In this book he explains his radical change of thinking which he describes as a paradigm shift. Previously the author knew Jesus Christ as his Lord and Saviour and he preached a gospel based on being saved from hell and going to heaven.

The focus was on teaching the Word, planting churches, and training workers – but something seemed to be missing. He felt he lacked the abundant life Jesus promised.

After speaking to a friend, described as his spiritual father, Darren's thinking changed and he discovered the lost paradigm for King and Kingdom.

This Kingdom paradigm shift is an all-or-nothing proposition. Kingdom teaching is nothing new. It's mentioned 150 times in the New Testament and the message Jesus taught was Kingdom centred.

Darren sees no separation between Kingdom life and the secular. He believes the Kingdom of God is here right now and involves our participation as salt and light in the world. He claims: 'The centre of history is the King and His Kingdom. Not an organization, not church meetings, nothing else. History is His story. We have ended up reducing Jesus to a religion and calling it Christianity, then named those who follow Christ as Christians'.

Not everyone will agree with Darren's claims, but he does back up his teaching with an abundance of scripture and his paradigm is worthy of consideration.

Containing 35 in-depth promises and a treasure trove of wise, godly counsel, What It Means When I Say 'I do' is among the finest pieces of literature on the topic of marriage that I have ever read. It is also a manual, with each of the 35 promises providing good guidelines on how spouses can build and sustain a strong, loving and joy-filled marriage as they come to understand that 'love is not only a word that describes feelings of affection but it is also an action word—a seed you plant in your heart and in the heart of your beloved, and nurture every day'.

Of particular note is the beautiful simplicity of the whole book. While each promise is underlined by colourful illustrations (created by Cindy's daughter, Sabrina) and an appropriate verse from the Bible on how God wants us to behave towards each other, there is nothing preachy or sanctimonious in how they have been presented to the reader. Rather, each promise—if faithfully kept—will work towards keeping the relationship with our spouse healthy and intact.

While this easy-to-read book is targeted more towards a Christian audience, I believe it will be well received by anyone who is really committed to making their marriage work.

In her introduction, Cindy asks us to consider the words of Gary Thomas: 'A good marriage is not something you find—it is something you work for.'

Demystifying Revelation

Demystifying Revelation by Graham Missen is a must have about the Book of Revelation. It is not just a copy of his notes used for a group study. This is something much more.

This book will find pride of place on the desks and bookshelves of those with a casual interest in eschatology (the study of end-time events), the novice student of the book of Revelation, and also those students with an ardent and passionate interest in the Bible's prophetic plan of events as the Apostle John wrote them in the Book of Revelation

Graham lays out the events of the time of the end thoroughly and Biblically, with ample cross referencing and understandable explanations of the challenges of interpreting the book.

This book is more than a book you'd read and gain much from. It is a reference book; it is a textbook; it is a clear and easily readable presentation of end time events. It is one of those books I believe will grace the reader's bookshelf as a go-to when needing to have a plain and followable account of God's prophetic calendar.

It is very timely that this book has arrived on the scene. The world we live in can be confusing and fearful. But the message of this book points us to a loving God who is Creator, Master and the One who is actually in control. It'll be an asset to any reader's library and you won't be disappointed having it handy.

Tips From an Editor

What you need to check (or choose) before starting (or opening) a new file

I know it is easy to open a new file and immediately start writing. However, there are a number of actions that are best to do first that will make your document easier to manage and potentially stop time-consuming changes being needed later.

In this first article I will concentrate on the changes you need to make/check on a new file in Word. I will write about other things to check in later articles.

- Under Layout all new computers have their page size set to Letter. This needs to be changed to A4 (or another metric size) as used in NZ.
- Under Paragraph/Indents and Spacing the default setting in Word is either Multiple 1.15 or Multiple 1.08. You need to change these settings to either single spacing or 1.5 line spacing and set Spacing Before to 0 pt. Not doing this will cause all sorts of issues when you try to format your document; most noticeable is that the page numbers will be too high from the bottom of the page. NB the settings for this magazine are different these recommendations are for your own writing.
- Under Layout/Margins the Normal/default settings for margins in a new document are 2.54 cm for all sides of the page. I will deal with Mirror Margins (when printing double sided) later.
- Home/Font there are two main different types of fonts to choose from, serif (with 'feet') and sans serif (without 'feet'). For example: popular serif fonts are: Times New Roman, Garamond, and Courier New, and popular sans serif fonts are: Helvetica, Calibri and Tahoma. Sans serif fonts are commonly used for documents on the internet.
- Justification there are two main types of justification. The icons are found under Paragraph/General/Alignment where you can choose left, centred, right or justified (sometimes also called ragged right). While people like the look of fully justified text Word does not maintain the same spacing between the words so sometimes what are called 'rivers of white' can form randomly and are unsightly through the text. Books, which commonly use full justification, use special programs that prevent this happening.
- Language under Home/Review/Language/Set Proofing Language to NZ English and set as default.
- Paragraphs there are two ways to space paragraphs in a document: 1) with a blank line between each paragraph; 2) with no line between paragraphs but with an indent, except for the first paragraph in a document, which has no indent.



It is a great testament to his humble and humorous nature that he formed so many long-lasting friendships over the years. We pay respect and tribute to a man of faith who I believe must have made a significant impact on countless people.

I remember being part of sharing Brian's brilliant book: *The Marriage You Never Dreamed Of: Practical Steps to Extraordinary Lasting Love* at Promise Keepers men's ministry events, on Rhema Media's broadcasting networks and at seminars and retreats for New Zealand Christian Writers.

Brian's books and writing are part of his legacy, one that is filled with faith, hope and love. It was due to his caring nature that he wanted others to benefit from finding extraordinary lasting love. Brian may never have foreseen the incredible impact and positive influence he would have on the marriages and relationships of those who would read his books.

Even more recently, Brian Taylor and Justine Orme published How Much is One Person Worth?: Understanding How To Set a Value on Your Self Worth. Brian and Justine wrote how, 'The purpose of this book is to provide answers for people who want to blossom, to flourish as whole people'. Brian was successful at sharing his life insights and wisdom with people. His publishing and speaking business, Acorns To Oak Trees, can be seen as Brian's personal metaphor for living a life of purpose. He knew great things come from small beginnings. In closing, may we find comfort in sharing God's Word from Second Corinthians chapter one, verses three to four:



We have great news for Level Three contestants. From 2023 the Level Three competitions will now also be six monthly which means double the chance to win a prize each year!



Competition points now go back to zero for the February 2023 competitions. In each magazine, place getters receive points: 15 points for first, 12 points for second and 9 points for third. At the end of May and November, those with the highest points in Levels One, Two and Three will be awarded monetary prizes for first, second and third.

Prizes up for grabs are: \$60 for First Place, \$50 for Second Place, \$40 for Third place. These are awarded as Manna Christian Store e-vouchers via email. Our next prize winners will be published in the Jun-Jul 2023 magazine edition.

All new members begin by entering in Level One. To be promoted to Level Two or Three, contestants need to receive points at least three times on their current level. Our judges also require regular entries and improved writing. All entrants receive helpful constructive feedback via email from the judges.

Competition Results

Level One

Judge: Debbie McDermott

Requirement: Imagine you are either Joseph or Mary (Jesus' earthly parents) and rewrite the Christmas story as you think they would have experienced it. Ensure you use the first person point of view (i.e. I, my, we, our). (500 words)

General Comments

It was pleasing to receive ten good entries to this competition. Each retelling of the Christmas story was well done and a couple of the entrants touched on interesting aspects I had not considered before. For instance, Fiona Murray's suggestion that the cloths used to swaddle Baby Jesus may have originally been set aside for the sacrificial lambs is particularly thought-provoking. So many scriptures and events foreshadow our Lord's sacrifice for us. Why not the swaddling cloths also?

Each entrant successfully told their story in the first person point of view. Five of the ten stories were written from Mary's perspective, while the other five were written from Joseph's perspective. It should be noted here that eight of the ten entrants were women and I highly commend the three ladies who chose to tell Joseph's side of the Christmas story. Women tend to be more sentimental than men so it was important for them to use a more pragmatic style in order to prevent Joseph's narrative from becoming mushy. This they did very well.

Equally pleasing was the standard of writing which was generally high. This meant there was little difference in marks between the winning entries and those who missed out on being awarded a place. Minor issues that resulted in a loss of marks included overusing/misusing commas or not using commas where needed; leaving out apostrophes; using hyphens instead of dashes; incorrectly capitalising common nouns; and wrong formatting. This has been discussed in my critiques to entrants.

There were also two major issues that some entrants need to address:

- 1. **Heading/Title**—all entries MUST have a short title written in Title Case (refer to formatting requirements in the magazine). For this competition, it was also important to have a suitable title or accompanying subtitle noting this was the Christmas story told from Joseph or Mary's point of view.
- 2. Biblical Accuracy—it is vitally important to ensure you do not misquote or contradict scripture when retelling a Bible story, as this can be highly misleading for an uninformed or non-Christian reader.

Level Two

Judge: Lesley Edgeler

Requirement: Author, Charles Martin, wrote: 'Music washes us from the inside out. It heals what nothing else can.' How would you respond to this statement? Name a favourite song or hymn which you believe has this effect on you and say why. (350 words)

General Comments

Both Plato and Aristotle affirmed that 'Music contained an intrinsic element that was conducive to the promotion of moral or spiritual harmony and order in the soul.' Music is truly a gift from God which can calm, soothe, heal, uplift, comfort and enable us to 'feel'. A universal language of the soul, music connects everyone in spite of their background and country of birth.

During the Covid lockdowns, one song had an impact in many countries of the world: The Blessing. This song linked us all together in a universal statement that all would be well, that we would get through and see better days.

Jehoshaphat sent out singers ahead of his army; the angels sang news of Christ's birth and Paul and Silas sang praises to God at midnight during their time in prison. All these show us just how important music is to God. In Zephaniah 3:17 (NKJV), we read, 'The LORD your God in your midst, the Mighty One, will save; He will rejoice over you with gladness, He will quiet you with His love, He will rejoice over you with singing.'

Music is vital to our ability to survive.

I received five varied entries, all well-written. Only three contestants referred to or responded to Charles Martin's statement. Some bibliographies were lacking.

It is important to list the requirements for the topic and cross them off as you include them in your writing. Correct spelling of song/hymn titles is paramount. Check a hymn book or look it up on the internet to make sure you spell and punctuate the words correctly and use upper or lower case properly. Every song/hymn chosen was very appropriate.

Clive McKegg wrote a very powerful and moving description of how one artist's songs helped him through a tough time. His title, Grace at Ground Zero, had me hooked from the start. I awarded him First Place

Great is Thy Faithfulness, a well-known favourite, was Jill Clarke's choice. The hymn is truly meaningful to her and her expression of how the words affected her are well-chosen. I awarded her Second Place.

Susan Flanagan's description of Jesus's love for us: 'Jesus paid it all...even his feet could love,' makes her interpretation of the topic requirements even more realistic. Her Third Placing is well-deserved.

When a statement is quoted, it is important to include it with your writing response.

Consistency is required when using upper or lower case in writing. If you have typed god in one sentence and God in another when both refer to the Creator, please check for any differences before submitting an entry. I was pleased to see all contestants used the specified format and were well-within the given word-count.

Grace at Ground Zero

'Music washes us from the inside out. It heals what nothing else can.' (Charles Martin)

God seems to have a healing song for us at each season of life. Several years ago, I was passing through a dark time in my relationship with God and with my wife as God was exposing hidden sins and wounds. A friend introduced me to the album 'Solo' by Kiwi artist Derek Lind. Shockingly, Lind's wife of 35 years died unexpectedly during the preparation of the album. Many of the songs were written in the aftermath — processing tragic loss, grief, and questioning of God. Consequently, the words and delivery are powerfully raw and confronting.

Listening to the album in my car often reduced me to vision-blurring tears. God used the pain of another to help me process my journey through the 'valley of weeping'. The song 'Come to Me' was especially cathartic.

Level Three

Judge: Julia Martin

Requirement: Write a story for children aged 8-12 years old about an event that had a deep impact on your life. Explain how and why and make sure your style and language are appropriate for this age group. (300 words)

General Comments

Writing successful stories for children is not always as easy as it may seem, especially in today's world with all the options available for their entertainment. In this assignment, writers are invited to share an incident or experience that has had a deep impact upon them, along with an explanation as to how and why this is so.

The event chosen had to be suitable for children aged 8 – 12 years who are the target audience in this case. The style and language used must also be appropriate for this specific age group.

Points to consider

- 1. Choose a captivating title and opening sentence to arouse the interest of the children.
- 2. As many children are reluctant readers today, the story needs to be fast moving and exciting, with short sentences creating interest, suspense and even humour.

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- Decide how you will tell the story in chronological order or with flash backs or flash forwards.
- 4. Tension and drama can build momentum and bring the story to life. The element of surprise can also be effective.
- 5. Because you are sharing your experience, the event will be told in the first person, from your point of view.
- 6. A good ending is essential. Possibly include a moral or takeaway message to leave a lasting impression on the reader, but keep it natural and subtle.

I received five good entries. Choosing the first and second place-getters was difficult as both entrants wrote entertaining and compelling stories about events that had an impact on their lives which they have obviously never forgotten. In each case the stories were suitable for the age group designated and the vocabulary and style were appropriate also.

I finally awarded first place to Pauline Marshall for her tragic mouse mystery which I'm sure this age group would relate to, and it had a strong moral as a takeaway. Second place went to Pat Kerr for her exciting, though bruising go-kart experience which would appeal to boys and girls. I awarded Janet Fleming third place. The other two entries were well-written but I felt they were more suitable for an older age group.
