Having family that is *united* makes me feel <u>blessed!</u>


Animals are never pests-just the best!

A Day in the Life of a Magazine Editor with editor, Jeremy Smith of Authentic Magazine

How long have you been editor of *Authentic Magazine*?

For context, *Authentic Magazine* is approaching its five-year anniversary. Our first issue was printed in December 2017 and we've just released our 19th! The short answer regarding my *Authentic* journey is,



I've been the editor for 15 months. It's a journey I can most definitely see the Lord's hand on – and guidance in – throughout. The very first interview I conducted and feature I wrote for *Authentic* was back in January 2020. However, it wasn't until August of that year that I actually joined the team as staff – initially as assistant editor. It was all in God's timing. Subsequently – following discussions with then editor and *Authentic* CEO Dave Firth, as well as trusted people in my life, I was asked to step into the role of editor. My first issue in that job was our 14th issue, published in June last year. Wow! That means I've already been part of producing nine issues!

How much writing do you need to do for each magazine issue?

There's quite a bit of work which I and the rest of our team do to help see each issue become a reality. From my perspective, strictly speaking content wise, we aim to have at least three key feature articles in each issue. I conduct those interviews and take the photos as required, then write the features. I also write each issue's editorial. Additionally, there are also times when I write an extra piece for the purpose of encouraging readers, as well as pieces for our review pages. Part of my role also involves sourcing content, working with our various contributors – who are amazing by the way! – and sourcing adverts and writing the copy for them, when required. Essentially, it's about working to ensure we have Christ-centered content of various types filling each of the 84 pages which make up every issue. I also proofread each article before it's processed and laid up by our awesome designers, so all in all I carefully read quite a bit of the content even before the final printed copy reaches the shelves. I'd like to think we're, for the most part, pretty thorough. Maybe I should offer a prize to anyone who finds a spelling mistake? Ha!

Do you work in an office or from home?

A combination really. We do have one staff meeting day as a whole team each week and then the rest is usually done either from home, or on my laptop, from wherever I'm based. I love that flexibility.

How many hours per week does your role generally require?

I'm full time with *Authentic*. When I'm not busily working away on magazine-related tasks, I pivot a bit to help with jobs which we complete for clients at our agency, Authentic Media. We work with a wide range of businesses, including camps, schools and many more.

Do you have to do any travel as part of your role?

Sure! I often meet people in person to have our chats and interviews, and have travelled to various places to do so. All I'll say is, at times, I'm so grateful we live in the day and age of Google Maps!

Who are the main readers your magazine is aiming to reach?

Our prayer as a team is that *Authentic Magazine* is a source of encouragement to Christian men. We want to help those men grow in their faith, knowledge and understanding of Jesus Christ. We also hope it can be a light to those living without Jesus. In fact, we have to say lots of women often tell us they read the magazine too!

We strive to fill each new issue of the magazine with great 'man stuff' – including challenging, encouraging and insightful articles which help men dig deep to rediscover the life God intended us to lead, great features which help us relate to other people and their individual faith journeys and useful tips and information to help us on our own walk with the Lord.

How much input do you have regarding the visual appearance of the magazine?

It's collaborative. We have a great team here, which includes designers, who – ultimately speaking – have a desire to use the awesome skills God has blessed them with to glorify Him. So, we all work together on this aspect – our goal being a high quality issue every time.

What is it like working to a deadline for the magazine?

It can get pretty busy at times! Particularly as the deadlines get closer. I don't think I can really say I ever get used to deadlines, although I have previously worked at newspapers and other publications for many years, so I suppose you work out processes and ways of working which help you to (mostly!) stay on top of things. *Authentic* is a quarterly publication and it's always amazing how fast each issue seems to roll around. I find it's better to continually keep working away regularly over time – that definitely makes the workload more manageable.

How many copies of each issue get printed for NZ subscribers – how many are sent digitally?

Each print run, we produce 3000 hard copies of the magazine and these are distributed throughout New Zealand in both the North and South islands in a variety of ways. These obviously include subscribers, as well as Christian bookstores, some prisons, medical clinics, churches and more. It's often quite surprising when we hear of where – and in which parts of New Zealand – people have come across *Authentic*. Digital numbers are slightly smaller and this was an option we provided as we began to get requests from people overseas – from all over the world in fact – who told us they wanted a way to read the magazine from where they lived.

Please describe a typical day in your life as a magazine editor.

The simplest way to do that is probably to say 'full of variety'. Maybe there isn't actually a 'typical' day, as such. What I'm doing solely depends on the day itself, and whatever the task is at hand. That variety is also part of what makes the job fun because you never really know how each day will be different. It could be anything from an office day sending out a whole bunch of emails or making phone calls, to travelling for interviews or events and simply networking with people. As I said, I often take photos too, or I'll spend time writing pieces and features, or proofreading copy. I love the doors this job opens and the people you get to meet throughout the course of the journey. Oh, and on second thought, maybe there is one constant – coffee!

What do you feel it is that makes *Authentic Magazine* a success?

Honestly, God. He deserves all the praise. This journey is one which has been outworked through Christ in us, in His strength and equipping not ours. We absolutely couldn't do this in our own strength! We need Him in each and every area of what we do. Oftentimes, I'm not sure what shape each issue is going to take, or how it will come together. But I will say I'm constantly praying that He will lead and guide the process and that – ultimately – each issue would simply bring Him glory. I want to be led by God in terms of the content He would have in the magazine. It's His publication, not ours and, ultimately, its pages should point anyone who reads the magazine to Jesus. I've heard it said, "God's not after our ability, He's seeking our availability..." and so that's my heart. I just want to be available to God and what He asks of me.

It's not my ability, or that of our team. It's Christ's life – and His equipping – in and through us. A friend of mine also once told me, "God doesn't call the qualified, He qualifies the called..." pointing me to 1 Thessalonians 5:24, "... The One who calls you is faithful, and He will do it." (NIV). I absolutely believe that as we continue to walk this Authentic journey for as long as this is where He'd have us be, then God will always provide for all our needs.

What advice would you give to a young writer/editor who aspires to work in magazine publishing?

Spell check is amazing! Ha! No, in all honesty, I'd probably say keep sharpening those pencils and honing those writing skills! And, as you look for opportunities and knock on doors, do so prayerfully, keeping Christ at the centre of all you do. Networking and reaching out to people you'd like to learn from, who are already doing the type of work you want to do, can be helpful too. That often builds useful connections. Ask them questions about aspects of the craft you want to grow in that you want to learn and that they already know. I sure did, and, in fact, I still do! And, as you hold everything before Christ, you can absolutely be assured that you can trust Him to open the right doors He has for you and keep doors you shouldn't walk through closed. In my case, I also ended up studying a joint journalism degree and diploma because I liked English when I was at school. As I look back on my own journey, it's amazing to see how God has moulded and shaped me through each previous experience and place I've worked. I may not have known how at the time, but looking back, all the glory is His and I thank Him for His leading and for the things He has taught me along the way.

Right, I've got features to write!
